Sunday, February 27, 1966.

Visited Oak Island and met Robert Dunfield and his wife and Mr. & Mrs. Armstrong.

Money Pit: down to 137ft. He proposed enlarging it when weather is warmer and less danger of earth slide. Drilling showed treasure chamber in four stories, 153 ft. down, gypsum walls.

Gypsum "excellent in making cement."
The walls may be natural formation.

Outcropping in Chester and on island south of Oak Island.
If water tunnel can be located it will be blocked and Money Pit pumped out.

Found bits of dishes in Money Pit at great depth, also timber.
Pick marks found on sides of Money Pit when enlarging it.

Found also "Halifax tunnels".
Found evidence of fanwise drains.

Somewhere on surface of island we are looking for entrance to Treasure Chamber.
It could be north of Money Pit where Johnson found air coming out of drill holes, "dry, stale" air.

Cave-in Pit# 2: down over 100 ft.
At 68 ft. found old timbers ^{two} with ^{planking} 52 ft. without result.

Also in Pit south of triangle.
